Lake Centenary

Man-made lake just north of town –water sports and picnic location for all.

Ariah Park

“The town of wowsers, bowsers and peppercorn trees” –the peppercorn trees are still there, the bowsers have been restored to the main street but there are no wowsers left now, but a pretty little main street “frozen” in the 1920's era. Enjoy a great meal at the pub.

Tours & Walks

Old Temora Cemetery – Tours organised through Visitor Information Centre or the Aromet reception. It “brings back to life” the stories of those buried there and gives a great glimpse of life in the early days of Australia.

Where to go? What to see?

Coolamon-The Rock

Take a look at enchanting Coolamon with its beautiful Cowabbie Street – a State Heritage listed Precinct and the RSL Hall that boasts a premium standard war museum and is home to the Fosse Diary. Make sure you stop at the “Up-to-date” Store, an old emporium which is still fitted out the way it was more than 100 years ago, complete with the only example of a cash changing system, operating on gravity only (and still operational). It’s amazing! Then head for Collingullie and on to The Rock “The Town with the Beautiful Backdrop” – just 5km south of Wagga Wagga. The Rock Hill is the best known landmark in the Riverina, previously known as Kengal and Hanging Rock. Just ask us for more information.

Cootamundra-Stockinbingal,



Visit Cootamundra – just 30 minutes from Temora, and site of Sir Donald Bradman’s birthplace – the old hospital. Cootamundra has “The Captain’s Walk”, featuring 14 bronze sculptures of Australian Test Cricket Captains. Return via Wallendbeen and its antique shop – and Stockinbingal with its quaint village architecture still intact, and another antique shop.


Junee

Visit the Junee Roundhouse Museum – filled with railway memorabilia and some operational steam engines, Monte Cristo, a superbly restored Colonial mansion built by the founder of Junee and now a Victorian residence and the liquorice and chocolate factory



Young

Home of cherries, wineries and some special attractions including Pat’s Dolls Train (more than 2,000 antique dolls in a restored railway carriage), the Chinese Tribute Gardens, Jacks Slab Hut, “The Price of Peace” Garden and Café, Lambing Flat Historical Museum, Jacaranda Hill Garden, Yandilla Mustard Sed Oil enterprise, JD’s Jam factory and restaurant and many orchards where you can purchase or pick cherries in season.



Grenfell

Grenfell’s main street is still frozen in Ben Hall’s era. Just outside Grenfell are the Weddin Mountains with walking tracks to Ben Hall’s cave and Holy Camp and a lookout. A short walk from Ben Hall’s cave camping ground is Seaton’s Farm, which has been preserved as an example of how a family endured the Depression years utilising only materials readily available. Grenfell is also the birthplace of poet

Henry Lawson and a bust of him is located in Main Street. A stroll around O’Brien’s Lookout historic goldfield and Endemic Garden is also recommended.

Wagga Wagga

Enjoy a cruise along the Murrumbidgee (except Tuesday) at 2pm. Or visit one of the wineries around the city; stop at the Museum or the Riverina Historical Council Chambers and its travelling exhibitions, the National Art Glass Gallery, or the Botanic Gardens. It’s also worth visiting Lake Albert and enjoying a relaxing period beside the gentle waters of this aquatic playground. There’s also lots of shopping in the city centre.

Lake Cargellico

A wonderful inland lake that will entrance you; enjoy a delightful picnic lunch beside the lake and even participate in some water sports (during summer, of course). Make sure your call in to the Visitor Information Centre there to learn more about the sights around the town.



Ardlethan

Home of the kelpie – and the site of a tin mine, recently closed down.

Griffith



The heart of the Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area, with wineries, a regional art gallery, gourmet food centre, a Fruit Salad Farm and lots more. Try a tour of the wineries – they produce some of the finest reds and some excellent white varietals and the tastings can last for a couple of days if you try to visit all the wineries. Check out the Visitor Information Centre in Temora for a special guide to the wineries.

Narrandera-Leeton

There’s a Tiger Moth Memorial, a ceramic fountain, one of only two in the world, created by Royal Doulton; one of the best golf courses in New South Wales, and Lake Talbot; the Bundidgerry Walking Track around the lake and the Murrumbidgee. At Leeton visit the Sunrice Centre, wineries, a local cheese factory, the Yanco Powerhouse Museum and the Whitton Courthouse Museum. Make sure you have time to inspect the Roxy Theatre one of the few remaining theatres of its type.



Matong



Location of Matong Memories. Renowned as one of the State’s premier outlets for antiques and collectables, Matong is a small village that you will find fascinating. There’s a delightful little park across the road from Matong Memories and there’s a great pub. Matong locals boast they have the best fishing along the Murrumbidgee – ask about the special spots.
